This area is characterized by two parallel mountain chains separated by a central valley, known as the Avenue of the Volcanoes. Many of Ecuador’s most iconic volcanoes—including Cotopaxi (5,897 m), Chimborazo (6,263 m, the farthest point from Earth’s center), and Sangay—are located here. The capital, Quito, sits high in the Andes at 2,850 meters (9,350 feet) and is one

of the highest capital cities in the world. Other important highland cities include Cuenca, known for its colonial architecture, and Baños, the adventure sports capital. When you examine a **map of Ecuador and Galapagos Islands**, note the winding roads that connect these highland towns, offering some of the most scenic drives on the continent.

The Amazon Rainforest (La

Amazonía or El Oriente)

East of the Andes lies the vast Amazon basin, covering about half of Ecuador's land area. This region, called El Oriente, is a low-lying, densely forested area home to incredible biodiversity and numerous indigenous communities, including the Waorani, Kichwa, and Shuar. The main gateway cities are Tena, Puyo, and Coca (Puerto Francisco de Orellana). The Yasuni National Park, one of the most biodiverse places on Earth, is located here. crossed by numerous rivers that flow into the Napo River, a major tributary of the Amazon River. This area is accessible by road from the highlands and by small aircraft.

The Galapago s Islands (La Región Insular)

No journey to Ecuador is complete without understanding the Galapagos Islands. This volcanic archipelago, a UNESCO World Heritage site, consists of 13 major islands, 6

smaller islands, and over 100 islets and rocks. The most well-known islands include Santa Cruz (home to the Charles Darwin Research Station), San Cristóbal (where the airport and the capital Puerto Baquerizo Moreno are located), Isabela (the largest island, shaped like a seahorse), and Floreana. On a **map of Ecuador and Galapagos Islands**, the archipelago appears as a scattered cluster roughly 1,000 km west of the mainland. Each island has its own unique ecosystem, with species ranging from giant tortoises to marine iguanas, blue-footed boobies, and Galapagos penguins. In the Galapagos,
inter-island
ferries connect
Santa Cruz, San
Cristóbal,
Isabela, and
Floreana. The

sea routes and
approximate

travel times.
