3. From the Pantheon, continue east to the Trevi Fountain via Via del Collegio Romano or Via dei Cestari.
4. From Trevi, walk north on Via delle Muratte to Via dei Due Macelli, which leads directly to Piazza di Spagna and the Spanish Steps.
5. This walk, clearly visible on
