

# How To Pass The Asvab Math

For each topic, practice both multiple-choice questions and free-response problems. Use flashcards for formulas (e.g., area of a circle =  $\pi r^2$ , slope =  $(y_2 - y_1)/(x_2 - x_1)$ ).

## 3. Use Active Learning Techniques

Passive reading or watching videos will not stick. Engage with the material by:

After each practice test, analyze every mistake. Did you misread the problem? Forgot a formula? Run out of time? Adjust your study plan accordingly.

## 6. Develop Smart Guessing Strategies

The ASVAB does not penalize for wrong answers, so never leave a question blank. Use elimination to increase your odds:

- Eliminate answers that are obviously too large or too small
- Check units (e.g., if a problem asks for feet, discard answers in inches)
- Plug answer choices back into the problem (reverse engineering)
- Look for patterns (e.g., if two answers are very close, one is likely correct)
