The production of *Dirty Dancing* was famously challenging. Filmed in the summer of 1986 in Lake Lure, North Carolina, and at Mountain Lake in Virginia, the conditions were grueling. The dance sequences were physically demanding, the budget was tight, and the schedule was relentless.
