For Areas of Continued Growth

- "Continues to develop fine motor skills needed for handwriting and cutting. Continued practice at home will be beneficial."
- "Is building confidence in reading and benefits from repeated practice with familiar texts."

- "Is working on following multi-step directions independently. Visual cues and checklists have been helpful."
- "With continued support, will be ready to take on the increased writing expectations of first grade."

COMMON MISTAKES TO AVOID IN KINDERGARTEN END OF YEAR REPORT CARD COMMENTS
