BREAKING DOWN THE SONG INTO PLAYABLE SECTIONS

The Outro: "Nothing really matters"

The song returns to the ballad feel, gradually fading out with a sense of resolution. The chords mirror the introduction, but with a slower, more reflective tempo. Use a fingerpicked arpeggio to bring the song full circle. The final chord is typically a Bb major or a Bb major 7, held until the sound decays completely. This is a beautiful opportunity to showcase the sustain of your ukulele and add a gentle vibrato to the final note.

ESSENTIAL TECHNIQUES FOR PLAYING THIS SONG

Fingerpicking vs. Strumming

To do justice to "Bohemian Rhapsody," you must master both fingerpicking and strumming. The intro, ballad, and outro sections benefit from a soft, arpeggiated approach where each finger plucks a string individually. The opera and hard rock sections demand energetic, rhythmic strumming.
