## The Fog of War: The British Failure at Fort Washington

In November 1776, the British captured Fort Washington and nearly 3,000 American soldiers in what was a crushing defeat. However, the victory was not a masterpiece of planning. It was a bloody affair that cost the British dearly. What if the American commander, General Nathanael Greene, had followed Washington's original advice and evacuated the fort? In an **alternate history Revolutionary War**, a successful evacuation would have preserved a core of veteran troops for the battles of Trenton and Princeton. The American environment, with its scarcity of labor and abundance of land, encouraged a unique culture of invention and mechanical tinkering.
