From the **Harbour Bridge**, follow the signs for the city centre and then Circular Quay. The car park entrance is clearly marked, but it is advisable to have your directions ready. These spaces are wider than standard bays to accommodate wheelchair access vehicles. Vehicle Height and Size Restrictions

One of the most important practical considerations for any underground car park is height clearance. The **Sydney Opera House Car Park** has a standard height limit of approximately 2.1 metres (depending on the specific level). This is suitable for most passenger cars, SUVs, and smaller vans. However, if you are driving a larger vehicle such as a campervan, a high-top van, or a vehicle with roof racks or cargo boxes, you must check the height restrictions carefully. There are bays available for taller vehicles on the lower levels, but these are limited and cannot be pre-booked in all cases. Given the limited number of charging stations, it is recommended to arrive early if you rely on this

PRICING STRUCTURE AND HOW TO SECURE A SPACE

Current Pricing Estimates

Generally, daytime parking (e.g., for a morning or early afternoon visit) can range from approximately \$30 to \$40 per hour, with a maximum daily rate cap applied. Evening parking for performances often starts at a set rate (e.g., \$25 to \$35) and then charges an hourly rate thereafter. Weekend parking can be slightly different, with special rates sometimes offered for Sunday visits.
