2. **Measure the Testing Distance:** A standard pocket chart is calibrated for a 10-foot (3-meter) distance. Use a tape measure to mark a line on the floor exactly 10 feet from the wall where you will hang the chart. Do not estimate. If the chart specifies a different distance (e.g., 5 feet or 14 inches for a near card), use that distance exactly.
3. **Control Lighting:** The chart should be well-lit with even illumination. Avoid direct glare from windows or overhead lights. The person being tested should not have light shining directly into their eyes. A standard room light

or a directed lamp on the chart is ideal.

4. **Test One Eye at a Time:** Have the person being tested stand or sit at the marked distance. Ask them to cover one eye with their hand or a piece of paper (avoid pressing on the eye). Do not use their fingers, as they may peek through the gaps.
5. **Start from the Top:** Ask them to read the smallest line they can see. They should try to read each letter on the line, from left to right. Do not allow squinting. If they guess a letter, mark it as incorrect.
6. **Record the Result:** The result is the smallest line on which the person can correctly identify more than half of the letters. Each line on the chart is labeled with a visual acuity fraction, such as 20/20, 20/30, or 20/40. Record this number for each eye separately.

Common Mistakes to Avoid

- **Wrong Scale:** Printing the PDF incorrectly is the number one cause of inaccurate results. Always check "actual size" in your print dialog.
- **Wrong Distance:** Using a 10-foot chart at 5 feet will make the letters look larger and give a falsely good result. Using it at 15 feet will make them look smaller and give a falsely poor result.
