

How To Sex A Rabbit

WHEN TO SEX YOUR RABBIT: AGE CONSIDERATIONS

Step 1: Prepare a Safe and Calm Environment

With the rabbit restrained, use your free hand to gently lift the tail upward. You will see two openings:

- **The Anus:** Located directly under the tail. This is the opening where feces exit.
- **The Genital Opening:** Located below the anus, closer to the belly.

The distance between these two openings and their shape are the key indicators for **how to sex a rabbit**.

Step 4: Apply Gentle Pressure (The "Eversion" Technique)

To get a clear view, you may need to gently evert (expose) the genital tissue. Place your thumb on one side of the opening and your index finger on the other. MALE RABBIT (BUCK)

- **Shape:** The genital opening will appear as a round, tube-like protrusion. When pressure is applied, it often forms a distinctive **circular or O-shape**. In older males, this is clearly a penis.
- **Distance from anus:** In a male, the genital opening is located **farther away** from the anus than in a female.
- **Testicles:** In rabbits older than 8-12 weeks, you may see two oval-shaped testicles on either side of the penis. They are hairless and can feel like small grapes. They may retract into the body cavity when the rabbit is cold or frightened.
- **Fur direction:** The fur around the genital area of a male rabbit often grows in a slightly different direction compared to a female, though this is a subtle cue.

FEMALE RABBIT (DOE)

- **Shape:** The genital opening of a female is a **slit or V-shape**. When pressure is applied, it does not form a round tube. Instead, it appears as a vertical slit. In some cases, you may see a small, pointed clitoral tissue, but it is much smaller than a male's penis and is not round.
- **Distance from anus:** In a female, the genital opening is located **very close** to the anus. The two openings are almost adjacent.
- **No testicles:** There will be no bulging testicles in a female.
- **Vulva shape:** The vulva may appear slightly pink and moist, especially in an unspayed adult female.

Step 6: Compare and Confirm

If you have multiple rabbits, comparing their genitalia side-by-side can be very helpful. The differences become much more obvious when you can see a male and female together. However, always handle rabbits separately and wash your hands between handling to prevent the spread of disease or stress hormones.

COMMON MISTAKES WHEN LEARNING HOW TO SEX A RABBIT

Even experienced owners can make errors. Here are the most common mistakes people make when learning **how to sex a rabbit**.

Mistaking the Clitoris for a Penis

Female rabbits have a clitoris that can sometimes protrude slightly, especially when pressure is applied. A new learner might see this small protrusion and assume the rabbit is male. However, the clitoris is usually more pointed and less round than a penis. The best way to avoid this is to focus on the shape of the opening itself (O-shape vs. V-shape) rather than any small protrusion.

Overlooking Retracted Testicles

Male rabbits can retract their testicles into the abdominal cavity when they are scared, cold, or stressed. This is a natural reflex. If you are examining a rabbit that is nervous, you might not see testicles even though it is a male. In this case, rely on the shape of the genital opening and the distance from the anus.

Handling the Rabbit Too Roughly

Rabbits have delicate spines and can injure themselves if they kick and struggle. Rough handling will also cause stress, which makes sexing more difficult. If the rabbit is fighting you, take a break. A calm rabbit is much easier to examine.

Relying on Behavioral Cues Alone

Some owners try to guess a rabbit's sex based on behavior. For example, a rabbit that mounts another rabbit is often assumed to be male. However, female rabbits also mount other rabbits to establish dominance. Similarly, a seemingly "calm" rabbit is not necessarily female. Behavior is not a reliable indicator of sex.

ALTERNATIVE METHODS AND WHEN TO CALL A PROFESSIONAL

While the manual sexing technique is the gold standard, there are other ways to determine a rabbit's sex, especially if you are unsure.

DNA Sexing

DNA sexing is a highly accurate method that can be performed on rabbits of any age. A veterinarian or a specialized lab takes a small sample, typically a blood sample or a cheek swab. The DNA is then analyzed for sex chromosomes. This method is useful for newborn kits or for owners who want absolute certainty.
