GRANDPA JOE

The loyal, excited grandfather who accompanies Charlie. He provides wisdom and joy, and his duet with Charlie, “I’ve Got a Golden Ticket,” is a highlight. This role often goes to an older student or a talented younger actor with strong stage presence.

ENSEMBLE ROLES

The kids script includes plenty of ensemble parts—Oompa Loompas, townspeople, reporters, and factory workers. These roles allow multiple students to participate without the pressure of solo lines. Oompa Loompa songs are particularly fun, with simple harmonies and snappy lyrics.

Adaptations and Cutting: What to Expect
