- **Physicality and Voice:**

Each character needs a distinct physical vocabulary and vocal pattern. The Caterpillar should be slow and deliberate. The Duchess might be erratic and violent.

Spend rehearsals exploring how these characters move and speak.

- **Pacing is Everything:**

Nonsense can easily become boring if it drags. Keep the energy high. Cut any moment that feels repetitive or doesn't serve the story.
