COMMON DIY SEX TOY PROJECTS

1. Simple Handheld Dildo from Household Items

Safety note: Never use objects that are breakable, such as glass bottles or thin plastic tubes. Always ensure the object has a flared base or a handle to prevent it from getting lost inside the body.

2. DIY Vibrator Using a Toothbrush Handle

If you want vibration without buying a commercial toy, a simple electric toothbrush can be transformed. The handle of many electric toothbrushes is waterproof and already designed to vibrate.

Materials needed:

- An electric toothbrush with a removable head and a waterproof handle
- A condom (to cover the handle)
- Silicone or a soft cover (optional, for texture)

Instructions:

1. Remove the brush head and clean the handle.
2. Cover the handle with a condom for hygiene. You may also attach a soft silicone finger puppet or a piece of sponge for added external stimulation.
3. Turn the toothbrush on to the lowest vibration setting.
4. Use the vibrating handle externally on the clitoris, nipples, or other sensitive areas. Do not insert the handle into the body unless it has a flared base and is fully covered.

Safety note: Do not submerge the toothbrush handle entirely in water unless it is rated waterproof. Keep the battery compartment dry. Only use this toy externally or with a barrier condom if inserting.

3. Homemade Masturbator (Stroker) Using a Sponge and Cup

For people with penises, a simple stroker can be made from a few household items. This design mimics a textured sleeve.

Materials needed:

- A clean, smooth plastic cup (like a disposable cup or a travel mug with a wide opening)
- Two soft, clean sponges (new kitchen sponges or cosmetic sponges)
- Scissors
- A condom
- Water-based lubricant
- Rubber band

Instructions:

1. Cut the sponges into strips or shapes that will fit inside the cup. Arrange them around the inside walls to create a channel in the center.
2. Insert a condom into the cup, lining the channel formed by the sponges. The open end of the condom should hang out over the rim of the cup.
3. Secure the condom around the rim with a rubber band.
4. Apply lubricant inside the condom.
5. Insert the penis into the condom-lined channel. The sponges will create pressure and texture as you move.
6. After use, discard the condom and sponges, and wash the cup with hot soapy water.

Safety note: Use only new, clean sponges. Never reuse sponges for this purpose as they are porous and can harbor bacteria. Dispose of all single-use items after each session.

4. Anal Toys: Butt Plugs from Silicone or Household Items

Anal play requires extra caution due to the sensitive nature of the rectum and the risk of losing a toy inside. The safest DIY option is to purchase body-safe silicone and mold a small plug with a wide, flared base. However, a quick alternative is using a smooth, flared object such as a silicone ice cube tray or a well-sanded, sealed wooden knob.

Simple (non-mold) version:

- Select a smooth, hard object with a flared base (e.g., a silicone kitchen spatula handle that widens at the end, or a thick, round candle with a wide base).
- Cover the object with a condom.
- Use plenty of lubricant and start small.
- Never insert anything without a flared base or a retrieval cord. Do not use items that can break, such as small glass jars or plastic toys.

ADVANCED DIY: WORKING WITH SILICONE

Silicone can be purchased online as two-part liquid (platinum-cure). - Always store toys in a clean, dry place away from direct sunlight and extreme temperatures. Keep them separate from other materials to avoid chemical reactions.
