Example 2: Three- Digit Dividend with Remaind er

Problem: $245 \div 6$

1. Can 6 go into 2?
No. So consider 24. How many times? 4 (since $6 \times 4 = 24$).
2. Write 4 above the second digit. Multiply $4 \times 6 = 24$, subtract from 24 to get 0.
3. Bring down the

5. How many times does 6 go into 5? Zero? Actually 6 goes into 5 zero times, so remainder is 5. But wait—if divisor is larger than the digit, we write 0 in the quotient? Yes. The quotient is 40 with remainder 5.

4. Check: $40 \times 6 = 240$, plus remainder 5 = 245. So answer is 40 R 5.

Worksheets that include such examples with space for each step help students avoid common mistakes like forgetting to place a zero in the quotient.
