HOW TO READ A PEYOTE PATTERN CHART

Pattern charts for peyote bead stitch patterns are usually presented as grids, where each square represents one bead.

The grid often shows the bead colors and the stitching direction. Rows are numbered, and arrows indicate whether you are working left-to-right or right-to-left. Understanding chart symbols is essential:

Ripping out peyote work requires patience, but it is better than continuing with errors. Also, ensure your needle size matches your bead hole size; too large a needle can split beads.

Circular Peyote Patterns

Circular peyote starts with a small loop of beads (often 5 or 6), then you add beads in rounds, increasing by placing two beads in certain stitches to expand the diameter. This technique is used for cabochon bezels, earrings, and decorative medallions. Patterns for circular peyote include floral motifs, mandalas, and sunbursts.

INCORPORATING COLOR AND TEXTURE INTO YOUR PATTERNS

Color choice dramatically influences the final look of peyote bead stitch patterns. Consider these principles:

- **Analogous colors:** Create a harmonious, gradient effect (e.g., blues to greens).
- **Complementary colors:** Generate high contrast and vibrancy (e.g., purple and yellow).
- **Monochromatic:** Use different shades of one color for subtle texture.

Mixing bead finishes—matte, metallic, transparent, or luster—adds depth. For instance, a matte bead next to a shiny bead creates a subtle sheen shift. When designing original peyote bead stitch patterns, experiment with bead sizes as well. Combining size 11° with size 15° beads can produce raised effects.

with 6 beads in a loop, then expand outward using consistent increases.

CARING FOR YOUR PEYOTE STITCH CREATIONS
