Given the Radius (Circumradius) and Number of Sides

This type is slightly trickier. The radius is the distance from the center to a vertex. For a regular polygon, the side length $s = 2 \times R \times \sin(\pi/n)$. The apothem $a = R \times \cos(\pi/n)$. Once you have these, apply the area formula.

Given the Perimeter Only

Sometimes a worksheet provides the perimeter and the number of sides. You then find the side length (perimeter / n), then the apothem as above, then the area.

STEP-BY-STEP EXAMPLE: SOLVING AN AREA PROBLEM

3. **Find the perimeter.** $P = n \times s = 9 \times 10 = 90$ cm.
4. **Apply the area formula.** $\text{Area} = (1/2) \times P \times a = 0.5 \times 90 \times 13.736 = 45 \times 13.736 = 618.12$ cm².

Thus, the area is approximately 618.12 square centimeters. Use of a calculator is normal and encouraged for decimal accuracy.

Many worksheets will require you to leave answers in terms of square root or as decimals to a given precision. Always read the instructions carefully.

Memorize the Key Formulas
