How to Make a Basic String Keychain

2. Fold both strings in half and place the loop over the key ring.
3. Pull the loose ends through the loop and tighten. This creates a lark's head knot.
4. Now you have four working strands. Separate them into two pairs.
5. Tie a simple overhand knot using each pair, about half an inch below the ring.
6. Continue tying overhand knots, alternating pairs, until the braided section is about four inches long.
7. Tie a final knot at the end, trim the excess string, and attach your keys.

This project teaches you how to make things with string in under ten minutes, and it makes a great starter piece for gift giving.

Creating a Coaster Using Basic Knots

Coasters are another wonderful beginner project. A square cotton string coaster can be made with a simple arrangement of square knots. For this you will need four strands of string, each about 40 inches long, plus a dowel or a sturdy piece of cardboard to hold your work. First, attach the strands to the dowel using a lark's head knot. Then, working from left to right, tie square knots with the center strands as the filler. Repeat rows until you have a small square. Trim and fringe the ends. Within an hour, you will have a functional coaster that protects your table and looks handcrafted.

INTERMEDIATE STRING CRAFTS: MACRAMÉ WALL HANGINGS

Once you are comfortable with basic knots, you can move on to macramé. This ancient textile art uses knotting techniques to create patterns and textures. Learning how to make things with string through macramé opens up possibilities for home décor, plant hangers, and even fashion

accessories.

Supplies for a Simple Macramé Wall Hanging

For a small wall hanging, you will need:

- A wooden dowel or a tree branch about 12 inches long
- Cotton macramé cord (3 mm thickness works well)
- Scissors
- A comb or brush for fraying the ends

Cut twelve pieces of cord, each about 6 feet long. Fold each piece in half and attach it to the dowel using a lark's head knot. You will now have 24 working strands. Divide them into groups of four. Tie a row of square knots across the entire width. Then, in the next row, skip the two outermost strands on each side and tie square knots with the remaining groups – this creates a zigzag pattern. Repeat for three or four rows. Finally, tie a simple gathering knot at the bottom to secure all strands, then fray the ends with a comb. Hang your wall art and admire your work.

Plant Hanger Using a Crown Knot

A macramé plant hanger is a classic string project that combines utility with beauty. The key knot in a plant hanger is the crown knot, which forms the ring at the top. After attaching four long cords to a ring, you tie a series of half-hitch knots down the length of the cords to create a cradle for the pot. Adjust the length according to your pot size. This project teaches you how to make things with string that are sturdy enough to hold a real plant. Be sure to use a strong nylon cord if the pot will be heavy.

DECORATIVE AND PRACTICAL ITEMS USING STRING

Beyond wall hangings and plant holders, there are countless other ways to apply your new skills. String crafts are not limited to decoration; they can also be functional.

Braided Pet Toys

If you have a dog or cat, you can make durable toys from cotton string. Braid three strands together tightly, then tie knots at each end. This creates a chew toy that is safe and washable. String Bowls and Baskets

How to Make a Chevron Friendship Bracelet

1. Cut six strands of embroidery floss, each about 36 inches long, in different colors.
2. Tie an overhand knot at the top, leaving a small loop, and tape the knot to a surface.
3. Arrange the strands in the order you want the colors to appear.
4. Take the leftmost strand and tie a forward knot over the second strand, then over the third, then the fourth, fifth, and sixth. This moves the left color to the center.
5. Now take the rightmost strand and tie backward knots over each strand moving leftward, until it also reaches the center.
6. Tie those two center strands together with a forward knot. You will see the beginning of a V shape.
7. Repeat steps 4-6 until the bracelet is long enough to wrap your wrist.
8. Tie an overhand knot at the end and trim the excess.

This pattern is a favorite among crafters because it is visually striking yet easy to memorize. With practice, you can make things with string that carry personal meaning as gifts for friends.

TIPS FOR SUCCESS WHEN LEARNING HOW TO MAKE THINGS WITH STRING
