STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE TO USING A DRYWALL LIFTER

- Secure the Drywall:** While the lifter holds the board in place, drive your screws. Start in the center of the board and work your way out to the edges to prevent sagging. Work quickly to secure the sheet before fatigue or shifting occurs.
- Lower and Release:** Once the board is fully fastened, slowly release the pressure on the lifter. For a manual hoist, carefully release the lock; for a hydraulic lifter, use the release valve to lower the cradle. Tilt the cradle back to the vertical position and move the lifter to the next location.
