
San Francisco To Las Vegas Road Trip

Barstow: The Gateway to the Desert

As you merge onto Interstate 15 near Barstow, you are officially entering the Mojave Desert. Barstow itself is a classic desert town with a long history as a railroad and Route 66 stop. The **Route 66 Mother Road Museum** is a fantastic place to stretch your legs and learn about the historic highway that paved the way for modern road travel. Barstow also offers the usual amenities of a highway hub, including ample gas stations, fast food, and hotels, making it a practical place to refuel both your car and yourself. The name was invented in the 1940s by a radio evangelist who established a health resort here. Today, the area is home to the Desert Studies Center, a research facility. While there is not much to see beyond a locked gate and a sign, the name itself has become a legend among road trip enthusiasts. Many travelers make a point of photographing the sign, and it serves as a wonderful conversation starter. It is a small, quirky highlight that adds a layer of linguistic oddity to your adventure.

ENTERING NEVADA: THE APPROACH TO LAS VEGAS

As you cross the state line into Nevada, the landscape begins to shift once again. The mountains become more rugged, and the desert floor opens up into wide valleys. - **Sunscreen and a Hat:** The sun in the desert is intense year-round. Even in winter, you can get a sunburn from the reflection off the sand and the high altitude. Protect your skin and eyes.
