Later versions of the 1MZ-FE in the Estima were equipped with Toyota's Variable Valve Timing system on the intake camshaft. The diagram will show the oil control valve (OCV) or VVT-i actuator. This unit uses engine oil pressure to rotate the camshaft slightly, optimizing torque and fuel economy across the rev range. A diagram showing the oil passages to the actuator is essential for diagnosing VVT-i rattles or error codes, such as P0010 or P0012.

The ACIS System

The Toyota Estima 3.0L V6 1MZ-FE engine diagram also reveals the ACIS (Acoustic Control Induction System).
