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WHAT IS THE DR LAM BLOOD GROUP DIET?

In the ever-expanding world of personalized nutrition, few approaches have sparked as much curiosity—and debate—as the Dr Lam Blood Group Diet. Although the diet shares some similarities with the more well-known Blood Type Diet by Dr. Peter D’Adamo, Dr. Lam has refined the recommendations with updated research on lectins, gut health, and individualized biochemistry. The result is a system that feels both ancient—rooted in evolutionary eating patterns—and modern, leveraging lab-based analysis of food sensitivities.

THE SCIENCE BEHIND THE DR LAM BLOOD GROUP DIET

To understand the Dr Lam Blood Group Diet, you first need a basic grasp of blood type biology. Your blood type is determined by the presence or absence of specific antigens (A and B) on the surface of your red blood cells. These antigens are not just markers for transfusions; they also exist on the lining of your digestive tract and other tissues. Dr. Lam also incorporates the concept of secretor status—whether you secrete your blood type antigens into bodily fluids like saliva and mucus. Approximately 80% of people are secretors, and Dr. Lam argues that secretors and non-secretors within the same blood type may need slightly different dietary modifications. This adds

a layer of personalization that goes beyond simple blood group categorization.

While the scientific community remains divided on the validity of blood type diets—many studies have found no strong evidence supporting the claimed health benefits—proponents of the Dr Lam Blood Group Diet point to anecdotal success stories and the general wisdom of eating whole, unprocessed foods. Even skeptics agree that the diet inherently encourages the consumption of vegetables, lean proteins, and healthy fats, which are beneficial for most people regardless of blood type.

HOW THE DR LAM BLOOD GROUP DIET WORKS: FOODS FOR EACH

BLOOD TYPE

Dr. Lam divides the human population into four primary dietary archetypes, each with its own recommended food list. Below is an overview of what the diet suggests for each blood type, keeping in mind that individual variation (secretor status, existing health conditions) should also be considered.

Blood Type O (The Hunter)

According to Dr. Lam, blood type O is the oldest blood group, dating back to our hunter-gatherer ancestors. Individuals with type O are said to have a hardy digestive system designed to handle

animal protein and fat. The ideal diet for type O is high in lean red meat, poultry, fish, and vegetables, while being low in grains, legumes, and dairy. Dr. Lam recommends avoiding wheat, corn, and kidney beans because their lectins may interfere with type O metabolism. Beneficial foods include beef, lamb, kale, spinach, and blueberries. Type O individuals are also encouraged to engage in vigorous aerobic exercise and to manage stress with physical activity.

Blood Type A (The Cultivator)

Blood type A emerged with the advent of agriculture, and Dr. Lam suggests that these individuals thrive on a plant-based

diet. Their digestive systems are believed to have lower levels of stomach acid and the enzyme alkaline phosphatase, making animal fats and proteins harder to break down. Type B individuals are said to respond well to moderate exercise combining cardio and balance work. They should avoid processed foods and peanuts, which can cause blood sugar

irregularities.

Blood Type AB (The Enigma)

As the rarest blood type, AB is a blend of A and B characteristics. Dr. Lam considers type AB to be both sensitive like type A and adaptable like type B. The diet for AB is therefore a hybrid: it includes some animal protein (especially lamb and fish) but limits red meat, and emphasizes dairy, tofu, and green vegetables. Most grains are acceptable, but corn and buckwheat should be avoided. Dr. Lam also advises type AB individuals to avoid caffeine and alcohol, as they may be more vulnerable to the stress hormone cortisol. Exercises that

combine relaxation with movement, such as swimming or hiking, are recommended.

Blood Type O

Sample Day

- **Breakfast:** Scrambled eggs with spinach and a side of blueberries. Coffee (black) is allowed for type O in moderation.
- **Lunch:** Large salad with romaine lettuce, cherry tomatoes, cucumber, grilled chicken breast, and olive oil & lemon dressing.
- **Snack:** A handful of walnuts and an apple.
- **Dinner:** Grilled lamb chops with steamed broccoli and roasted sweet potatoes (type O can tolerate sweet potatoes in small amounts).
- **Beverage:** Herbal
