Condition: The Critical Difference

1. **Loose Figure Condition:** A loose figure (out of its original packaging) is valued based on paint wear, stress marks, loose joints, and overall cleanliness. A mint loose figure with no flaws is far more desirable than a played-with one.
2. **Packaging Condition:** For carded figures, the card condition is paramount. A figure on a pristine, unpunched card with clear bubbles (no yellowing or cracks) can be worth 10 to 100 times more than the same figure on a crushed, torn, or sun-faded card.

NAVIGATING BY ERA: A TIMELINE OF VALUE

Star Wars action figures span multiple generations, each with its own unique market dynamics. Understanding these eras is essential for using any price guide effectively.

The Vintage Era (1977-1985): The Originals

This is the gold standard of collecting. The original Kenner line, from the first 12 figures to the final Power of the Force series, is the most researched and valued segment of the market. Key figures in this era include:

- **The Black Series (2013-Present):** This is the current mainline. Value is highly volatile. A figure that is \$25 today can be \$150 tomorrow if it becomes scarce. The "Archive" line and convention exclusives (like the Target-exclusive "Jedi Knight Revan") are key items to watch. CONDITION GRADING: THE 10-POINT SCALE

- **C-4 to C-1 (Poor):** Generally not collectible except as a placeholder or for parts.

TIPS FOR BUYING AND SELLING

For Buyers

1. **Always Ask for Photos:** Especially for carded figures, request close-ups of the bubble, card edge, and figure front/back.
2. **Know Your Variation:** If you are a serious collector, learn the specific COO and paint masks of your target figure. Paying a premium for a "common" version is a common mistake.
3. **Factor in Shipping:** A \$50 figure with \$15 shipping is actually a \$65 figure. Always look at the all-in cost.
4. **Use a Price Guide as a Baseline, Not a Rule:** The **Star Wars action figure price guide** you consult is a tool, not a decree. Market sentiment and timing (e.g., the release of a new movie) can spike prices temporarily.
