HOW TO USE A LINEAR EQUATIONS IN ONE VARIABLE WORKSHEET EFFECTIVELY

Start with a Pre-Teach

Identify Error Patterns

After the worksheet is completed, take time to review the errors. Do not just mark problems as right or wrong. Look for patterns. Is the student consistently making sign errors? Are they forgetting to distribute the negative sign? Are they skipping steps? Once you identify the pattern, you can create a mini-lesson or

a targeted practice session to address that specific issue.

COMMON MISTAKES STUDENTS MAKE ON THESE WORKSHEETS
