Geometry

Students must graph points in the first quadrant of the coordinate plane and interpret coordinate values of points in real-world contexts. They also classify two-dimensional figures (polygons, triangles, quadrilaterals) into categories based on their properties. Understanding that attributes belonging to a category of two-dimensional figures also belong to all subcategories of that category is a key logical skill.

For instance, a student should understand that a square, because it has four right angles and two pairs of parallel sides, is always a rectangle, a parallelogram, and a quadrilateral. This hierarchical classification is a significant step up from simply naming shapes in earlier grades.

EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES FOR 5TH GRADE MATH TEST PREP CALIFORNIA
