Under the brutal dictatorship of François "Papa Doc" Duvalier and later his son Jean-Claude "Baby Doc" Duvalier, the Tonton Macoutes were often called dew breakers because they would arrive at their victims' homes at dawn, before the dew had lifted, to carry out arrests, torture, and executions. The Dual Identity of the Dew Breaker

One of the most compelling aspects of the novel is how Danticat presents the dew breaker not as a monster but as a deeply flawed, complex human being. He is both the perpetrator of violence and a loving father, a devoted husband, and a respected member of his community. This
