

How To Put Nanny On Resume

WHY NANNY EXPERIENCE IS MORE VALUABLE THAN YOU THINK

Before we dive into the mechanics of formatting, it helps to shift your mindset. Nannying is not "just babysitting." Professional nannies manage schedules, communicate with parents, educate children, handle emergencies, manage budgets, and often work under high-pressure conditions. These responsibilities mirror many competencies found in corporate and service-oriented roles.

When recruiters see nanny experience on a resume, they are actually looking for evidence of:

- **Project management:** Coordinating daily routines, activities, appointments, and travel.
- **Communication:** Navigating sensitive conversations with parents, children, and sometimes other household staff.
- **Crisis management:** Remaining calm during medical emergencies, tantrums, or unexpected schedule changes.
- **Time management:** Juggling multiple priorities while staying flexible.
- **Instruction and mentoring:** Teaching academic concepts, life skills, and emotional regulation.

Understanding this helps you frame every bullet point with intention. You are not just listing what you did — you are showing what those actions prove about your professional capability.

STEP 1: CHOOSE THE RIGHT RESUME FORMAT FOR NANNY EXPERIENCE

Not all resume formats present nanny work equally well. Your goal is to minimize the perception that you have "only" done childcare, especially if you are pivoting to a different sector. The three main formats are:

Chronological Resume

Best if you are staying in childcare or education and have a consistent work history. List your most recent nanny position first, followed by earlier roles.

Functional Resume

Ideal if you are changing careers or have gaps in employment. Group your skills into categories like "Child Development & Education," "Household Management," and "Crisis Response," and then list your nanny roles briefly below.

Hybrid (Combination) Resume

This is often the strongest choice for nannies transitioning into other fields. You lead with a skills summary that highlights transferable abilities, then include a condensed chronological work history. This format answers the recruiter's question: "What can this person do for me?" before they see job titles.

When deciding how to put nanny on resume content, the hybrid format gives you the most flexibility to emphasize relevance while still showing professional progression.

STEP 2: CRAFT A PROFESSIONAL SUMMARY THAT COMMANDS ATTENTION

Your professional summary is the first thing a recruiter reads. Avoid generic phrases like "Reliable nanny with 5 years of experience." Instead, view your summary as a value proposition.

Weak summary:

"Dedicated nanny with experience caring for children ages 2 to 8. Looking for a position where I can use my childcare skills."

Strong summary:

"Certified early childhood educator and professional nanny with eight years of experience managing daily routines, developmental activities, and household logistics for families with children ages newborn to 12. Skilled in curriculum planning, behavior guidance, and family communication. Proven ability to create structured yet nurturing environments that support children's social, emotional, and academic growth. Seeking to leverage these mentoring and organizational skills in a family-centered administrative role."

Notice how the strong summary reframes the same experience into language that appeals to a broader range of employers. That is the heart of knowing how to put nanny on resume content effectively.

STEP 3: WRITE BULLET POINTS THAT DEMONSTRATE IMPACT

When detailing your nanny duties, move beyond task lists. Each bullet point should follow a "What you did, how you did it, and what the result was" structure. Use strong action verbs and include numbers when possible.

Weak bullet points:

- Cared for three children.
- Made meals.
- Took kids to activities.

Strong bullet points:

- **Managed the daily schedule** for three children ages 4, 7, and 10, including school drop-off/pickup, extracurricular activities, medical appointments, and meal preparation, ensuring 100% on-time attendance for all commitments.
- **Designed and implemented age-appropriate learning activities** that improved the 4-year-old's letter recognition by 40% within six months and supported the older children's homework completion.
- **Communicated daily with parents** through written reports and verbal updates, fostering trust and alignment on childcare approaches and developmental milestones.
- **Handled household logistics** including grocery shopping, budget tracking for children's expenses, and coordinating with contractors for home maintenance, reducing family administrative workload by approximately 10 hours per week.

Each bullet point now serves as evidence of a transferable skill. A hiring manager in education, healthcare, administration, or hospitality can see the relevance even if they have never hired a nanny before.

STEP 4: HIGHLIGHT EDUCATION AND CERTIFICATIONS

Education matters, but certifications can make your resume stand out, especially when learning how to put nanny on resume content for roles in early childhood education or healthcare.

- **CPR and First Aid certification** — essential for any role involving children or vulnerable populations.
- **Child Development Associate (CDA) credential** — a huge plus for education or daycare roles.
- **Bachelor's degree in Early Childhood Education, Psychology, or a related field** — list this prominently even if your nanny work was separate from your degree.
- **Newborn Care Specialist (NCS) training** — valuable for pediatric nursing or doula roles.
- **Driving record and clean background check** — if relevant to the job, list these as professional credentials.

Position this section near the top if your certifications are especially relevant to the role you are targeting. If you have limited formal education, lead with experience and highlight professional development courses.

STEP 5: BUILD A SKILLS SECTION THAT USES KEYWORDS FROM THE JOB DESCRIPTION

One of the most overlooked parts of knowing how to put nanny on resume content is tailoring the skills section. Many applicant tracking systems (ATS) scan resumes for keywords. If you apply for a teaching assistant role, your skills section should include terms like "classroom management," "lesson planning," and "behavior support." If you apply for a household manager role, emphasize "budgeting," "scheduling," "meal planning," and "vendor management."

Example skills section for a nanny transitioning to an educational role:

- Curriculum Development
- Behavioral Guidance
- Parent-Teacher Communication
- Individualized Education Plans (IEP) Support
- Conflict Resolution
- Early Literacy & Numeracy Instruction
- CPR & First Aid Certified

Example skills section for a nanny moving into administration or management:

- Schedule Coordination
- Budget Management
- Vendor & Contractor Liaison
- Written & Verbal Communication
- Team Collaboration
- Prioritization & Multitasking
- Crisis Management

Tailoring this section for each application is a best practice that dramatically improves your chances of passing ATS filters and catching a recruiter's eye.

STEP 6: USE ACTION VERBS THAT CONVEY PROFESSIONALISM

The verbs you choose shape the impression you make. Replace passive or weak verbs with active, professional ones. Here is a quick reference list:

- **Coordinated** instead of "helped with"
- **Implemented** instead of "did"
- **Facilitated** instead of "assisted"
- **Managed** instead of "took care of"
- **Designed** instead of "made"
- **Monitored** instead of "watched"
- **Educated** instead of "taught"
- **Resolved** instead of "handled"
- **Optimized** instead of "improved"
- **Documented** instead of "wrote down"

Using these verbs consistently throughout your bullet points reinforces a professional image and makes your nanny experience look like any other business role.

STEP 7: TAILOR YOUR RESUME FOR DIFFERENT TARGET ROLES

Knowing how to put nanny on resume content is not one-size-fits-all. The same nanny experience can be framed differently depending on the job you want.

For a teaching or early childhood education role:

- Emphasize lesson planning, developmental assessments, classroom structure, and collaboration with parents.
- Use terms like "learning objectives," "milestone tracking," and "positive reinforcement strategies."

For a hospitality or customer service role:

- Highlight your ability to remain calm under pressure, manage multiple requests, and provide excellent service.
- Use terms like "client satisfaction," "problem resolution," and "multitasking."
