KEY DOMAINS OF 1ST GRADE MATH COMMON CORE STANDARDS

The 1st Grade Math Common Core Standards are organized into four critical domains. Each domain contains specific clusters of

standards that target essential skills and knowledge. Understanding these domains helps parents and educators see the bigger picture of what first graders are expected to learn.

Operations and Algebraic Thinking

This domain is the heart of first-grade mathematics. It focuses on developing a strong foundation in addition and subtraction. Students learn to represent and solve problems involving addition and subtraction within 20. They also understand the relationship between these two operations and work toward achieving fluency. Key skills within this domain include:

- **Representing and solving problems:** Students use objects, drawings, and equations to solve word problems involving adding to, taking from, putting together, taking apart, and comparing situations.
- **Understanding the meaning of the equal sign:** First graders learn that the equal sign represents balance and equivalence. They determine if equations like $4 + 3 = 7$ or $6 + 2 = 5 + 3$ are true or false.
- **Applying properties of operations:** Children explore strategies such as the commutative property (knowing that $3 + 4$ is the same as $4 + 3$) and the associative property to solve problems more efficiently.
- **Adding and subtracting within 20:** By the end of first grade, students should demonstrate fluency in addition and

subtraction facts within 10, and be able to use a variety of strategies for problems within 20.

- **Counting on and making ten:** Strategies like counting on from a larger number or decomposing numbers to make a ten (for example, $8 + 6$ becomes $8 + 2 + 4$) are emphasized to build number sense.

Number and Operations in Base Ten

This domain builds the crucial understanding of our place value system. In first grade, students move beyond counting by ones and begin to see numbers as groups of tens and ones. This understanding is foundational for all future work with larger numbers and operations. The key expectations include:

- **Understanding place value:** Students learn that the digits of a two-digit number represent amounts of tens and ones. For example, they understand that 43 means 4 tens and 3 ones.
- **Comparing two-digit numbers:** Using their understanding of place value, first graders compare numbers using the symbols $>$, $=$, and $<$.
- **Adding within 100:** Students add a two-digit number and a one-digit number, as well as a two-digit number and a multiple of ten, using concrete models, drawings, and strategies based on place value and properties of

operations.

- **Mentally finding ten more or ten less:** Without counting, students learn to quickly identify the number that is ten more or ten less than any given two-digit number.

Measurement and Data

This domain brings mathematics into the tangible world. First graders learn to measure objects, tell time, and organize information. These skills connect math to everyday life and help children see its relevance. Key standards include:

- **Measuring lengths indirectly and by iterating length units:** Students order three objects by length and use a shorter object to measure a longer one. They begin to understand the concept of a standard unit of measurement.
- **Telling and writing time:** Children learn to tell and write time in hours and half-hours using analog and digital clocks. This practical skill helps them develop a sense of time passing.
- **Representing and interpreting data:** First graders organize data by sorting items into categories and using picture graphs or bar graphs to represent the information. They ask and answer questions about the data, such as how many more or how many fewer.

Geometry

Geometry in first grade focuses on recognizing, describing, and composing shapes. Students move beyond simply naming shapes to understanding their attributes and how shapes can be combined or partitioned. Important standards encompass:

- **Reasoning with shapes and their attributes:** Students distinguish between defining attributes (like number of sides and vertices) and non-defining attributes (like color or size). They build and draw shapes that possess specific attributes.
- **Composing two-dimensional and three-dimensional shapes:** Children create new shapes by combining existing ones, such as putting two squares together to form a rectangle. This fosters spatial reasoning and creativity.
- **Partitioning shapes into equal parts:** First graders learn to partition circles and rectangles into two and four equal parts, and they use the vocabulary of halves, fourths, and quarters.
