Working with a registered dietitian who specializes in digestive health is highly recommended for this process. They can guide you through the phases, ensure nutritional adequacy, and help you interpret your results. While the Low

However, **soluble fiber** dissolves in water to form a gel-like substance, which helps regulate bowel movements. It softens hard stools and firms up loose stools, making it beneficial for both constipation and diarrhea. Excellent sources of soluble fiber include oats, psyllium husk, chia seeds, flaxseeds, and the flesh of fruits like apples and pears (without the skin). Including these in your **diet for irritable bowel syndrome diet plan**

can provide significant symptom relief.

## The Role of Probiotics and Gut Health

Your gut microbiome plays a central role in digestion and IBS symptoms. Probiotics are live beneficial bacteria that can help restore balance in the gut. Certain strains, particularly *Bifidobacterium infantis* and some *Lactobacillus* strains, have been shown to reduce bloating and abdominal pain in people with IBS. - **Healthy fats:** Olive oil, coconut oil, avocado (small amounts), and nuts like macadamia and pecans.

- **High-FODMAP fruits:** Apples, pears, watermelon, mangoes, and dried fruits.
- **High-FODMAP vegetables:** Onions, garlic, cauliflower, broccoli, cabbage, and asparagus.
- **Wheat and rye products:** Bread, pasta, cereals made from these grains (unless labeled gluten-free).
- **Legumes:** Beans, lentils, chickpeas, and soybeans.
- **Lactose-containing foods:** Milk, soft cheeses, ice cream, and yogurt (unless lactose-free).
- **Sweeteners:** Honey, agave syrup, high-fructose corn syrup, and sugar alcohols like sorbitol and



xylitol (often found in sugar-free gum and candies).

- **Irritants:** Spicy foods, caffeine, alcohol, and very fatty or fried foods.

## Sample One-Day Menu for an IBS Diet

**Breakfast:** A bowl of oatmeal made with lactose-free milk, topped with a handful of blueberries and a tablespoon of chia seeds.

**Morning Snack:** A firm banana.

**Lunch:** Grilled chicken breast salad with

mixed greens, carrots, bell peppers, cucumber, and a simple olive oil and lemon dressing. A small side of quinoa.

**Afternoon Snack:** A small handful of pecans and a hard-boiled egg.

**Dinner:** Baked salmon with roasted potatoes and steamed green beans. Seasoned with herbs and a little olive oil.

**Evening Snack (if needed):** A glass of lactose-free kefir.
