Digital and Online Games for Individual Practice

- **Prodigy Math:** This is a massively popular online role-playing game (RPG) where students solve math problems to cast spells and defeat monsters. It categorizes them by skill, making it easy to find games for specific topics like fraction equivalence, area and perimeter, or multi-digit multiplication. Games like "Factor Feeder" or "Pizza Pandas" are highly engaging and provide quick, targeted practice. It is an excellent resource for teachers looking for a quick math center activity or parents wanting to supplement homework.

HOW TO CHOOSE THE RIGHT GAME FOR YOUR FOURTH GRADER
