EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES FOR SOLVING FRACTION WORD PROBLEMS

7. **Check your**

answer – Does it make sense in the context? If the problem asked for a remaining amount, the answer should be less than the original quantity.

SAMPLE PROBLEMS FROM A WORD PROBLEMS

FRACTIONS WORKSHEET

To illustrate the variety, here are three typical problems you might find on a well-designed worksheet.

Problem 1 (Simple Addition): A runner covers $\frac{2}{5}$ of a mile in the first lap and $\frac{3}{10}$ of a mile in the second lap. How far did she run altogether? (Answer: $\frac{7}{10}$ mile)

Problem 2 (Multiplication): A garden is $\frac{3}{4}$ of an acre. If $\frac{1}{2}$ of the

garden is planted with tomatoes, how many acres are planted with tomatoes? (Answer: $\frac{3}{8}$ acre)

Problem 3 (Multi-Step): Sara had $\frac{7}{8}$ of a bottle of juice. She poured $\frac{1}{4}$ of the bottle for herself and then gave $\frac{1}{3}$ of the remaining juice to her friend. What fraction of the original bottle does Sara have left? (Answer: $\frac{7}{12}$ of the bottle - solve: begin with $\frac{7}{8}$, subtract $\frac{1}{4}$ (or $\frac{2}{8}$) = $\frac{5}{8}$; then give $\frac{1}{3}$ of $\frac{5}{8}$ = $\frac{5}{24}$; remainder = $\frac{5}{8} - \frac{5}{24}$ =
