Improvisation and Phrasing

The written sheet music provides the framework, but “Spain” is a jazz piece designed for improvisation. The solo section is typically based on a cycle of dominant chords. For your solo, focus on using the Spanish Phrygian mode (which includes a flat second and flat sixth) to maintain the authentic flavor of the piece. Listen to Chick Corea’s solo on the original recording as a model. He uses rhythmic repetition, space, and dramatic dynamic shifts. COMMON MISTAKES TO AVOID
