These disputes can escalate quickly, especially if you have no written or photographic evidence. A systematic inspection protects both you and the landlord by creating an agreed-upon record of the unit's condition.

HOW TO PREPARE FOR YOUR APARTMENT WALKTHROUGH

Before you begin your inspection, gather a few simple tools. You will need a printed copy of your checklist, a smartphone or camera for photos and videos, a pen or pencil, and perhaps a small flashlight for dark corners. If possible, schedule the walkthrough during daylight hours so you can see natural light conditions and spot imperfections more easily. Bring a friend or family member if you can; a second set of eyes can catch things you might miss.

Plan to spend at least 30 to 45 minutes on the inspection, depending on the size of the unit. Do not rush. Open every cabinet, flush every toilet, turn on every faucet, and test every light switch. This is your only chance to document the

ROOM-BY-ROOM APARTMENT INSPECTION CHECKLIST

Kitchen Inspection Checklist

- **Cabinets and Drawers:** Open and close every door and drawer. Look for broken hinges, sticky tracks, warped wood, or missing handles.
- **Sink and Faucet:** Turn on the water and check both hot and cold flow. Look for leaks under the sink. Test the garbage disposal if present.
- **Stove and Oven:** Check that all burners heat properly. Open the oven and look for excessive grease or damage.

Confirm that knobs are intact and functional.

- **Refrigerator:** Open the doors and check for cracks in shelves, ice buildup, or unusual odors. Verify that the freezer is working and that the door seals are tight.
- **Dishwasher:** If included, run a short cycle to ensure it drains and cleans properly. Check the racks for rust or damage.
- **Backsplash and Walls:** Look for grease splatters, holes, or peeling paint.
- **Flooring:** Inspect for stains, cracks in tile, loose linoleum, or damaged vinyl.
- **Lighting and Ventilation:** Test all light fixtures and the range hood fan. Make sure the exhaust fan works and is not excessively noisy.

Bathroom Inspection Checklist

Bathrooms are prone to moisture damage, mold, and plumbing issues. A careful inspection here can prevent major headaches later.

- **Toilet:** Flush several times to ensure it functions properly and does not run continuously. Check the base for leaks or water damage.
- **Sink and Vanity:** Run the water and check for slow drainage. Look for cracks in the sink basin or vanity top.

- **Shower and Tub:** Turn on the shower and check water pressure. Look for cracks in the tub or shower pan. Inspect the grout and caulking for mold or gaps.
- **Mirror and Medicine Cabinet:** Check for cracks, chips, or loose mounting. Open and close the cabinet door.
- **Ventilation Fan:** Turn it on and ensure it exhausts properly. Listen for unusual noises.
- **Flooring:** Look for water stains, loose tiles, or soft spots that could indicate subfloor damage.
- **Towels Bars and Fixtures:** Gently pull on towel bars, toilet paper holders, and shower curtain rods to ensure they are securely attached.

Living Room and Bedrooms Inspection Checklist

These areas typically have fewer systems to check, but they still require careful attention to surfaces and fixtures.

- **Walls and Ceilings:** Look for cracks, holes, nail pops, water stains, or peeling paint.
- **Flooring:** Check carpets for stains, burns, or tears. For hardwood or laminate, look for scratches, dents, or warped planks. Note any loose or squeaky floorboards.
- **Windows:** Open and close each window. Check that locks function properly. Look for cracked glass, broken screens, or damaged frames.

- **Window Coverings:** Test blinds, curtains, or shades. Look for missing slats, tangled cords, or broken mechanisms.
- **Doors:** Open and close every door. Check that latches and locks work. Look for scratches, dents, or doors that stick.
- **Closets:** Inspect shelves, rods, and hooks. Look for signs of pests or water damage.
- **Light Switches and Outlets:** Test every switch and bring a small device to check that outlets are working. Look for discoloration around outlets.
- **Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors:** Confirm that they are present and test them if possible. Note the location of each detector.

Additional Areas to Inspect

Depending on your unit, there may be other spaces that need attention. Do not forget these important areas.

- **Hallways and Entryway:** Check for scuffed walls, damaged baseboards, and loose handrails.
- **Balcony or Patio:** Look for cracks in the concrete, loose railings, or damaged screens. Check that the door locks securely.
- **Storage Areas:** If you have a storage closet or unit, inspect it for cleanliness and structural issues.
- **Utility Closet:** If accessible, look at the water heater, HVAC unit, and electrical panel. Note any rust, leaks, or unusual sounds.
- **HVAC System:** Turn on the heating and cooling to ensure

they work. Check that vents are clean and unobstructed. Change the air filter if needed and document its condition.

HOW TO DOCUMENT YOUR FINDINGS EFFECTIVELY

Having a checklist is only half the battle. You must document your findings in a way that is clear and indisputable. Use your smartphone to take photos and videos of every issue you find. Capture close-ups of damage and wide-angle shots that show the context. If you notice a stain on the carpet, photograph it with a ruler or coin next to it for scale. For each photo, verbally note the location and nature of the issue in a video recording, or write it down on your checklist.

When you complete your walkthrough, compile all your notes and media into a single file. Share a copy with your landlord or property manager and ask them to acknowledge receipt in writing. Many rental agreements have a specific window of time for submitting inspection reports, so be sure to act promptly. A well-documented **sample apartment inspection checklist** becomes your official record of the apartment's condition at move-in.

WHAT TO DO WHEN YOU FIND PROBLEMS

It is not uncommon to discover issues during your inspection. When you do, stay calm and professional. Note the problem on your checklist and discuss it with your landlord or property manager. Request that the landlord make repairs and have them documented in writing. If the issues are severe and the landlord is unwilling to fix them, you may want to reconsider signing the lease or negotiate a lower rent. However, most landlords appreciate a thorough tenant who cares about the condition of the unit. Negotiating Repairs and Credits
