The following year, with encouragement from friends including the fantasy writer George MacDonald, Carroll revised and expanded the manuscript, engaging the famed illustrator **Sir John Tenniel** to create the iconic images. The result was *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland*, published in 1865 under the pen name Lewis Carroll.

## Why Did He Use a Pen Name?

Many readers wonder why the author of Alice in Wonderland chose to publish under a pseudonym. Charles Dodgson wanted to keep his academic and creative lives separate. The name "Lewis Carroll" is a playful Anglicization of his real names: "Lewis" is the anglicized form of "Ludovicus," the Latin version of "Lutwidge," and "Carroll" is an anglicized form of "Carolus," the Latin for "Charles."
