Question: A rectangular prism has a length of 5 cm, a width of 3 cm, and a height of 4 cm. What is the volume of the prism?

(Correct Answer: 60 cubic centimeters)

Geometry

Question: Which statement is always true about a square?

- A.) It has exactly one pair of parallel sides.
- B.) All four sides are equal, and all four angles are right angles.
- C.) It has no lines of symmetry.
- D.) It is a triangle with equal sides.

(Correct Answer: B)

These examples demonstrate the range of skills—from computational fluency to conceptual understanding to vocabulary knowledge—that a comprehensive practice test assesses.

COMMON MISTAKES STUDENTS MAKE AND HOW TO CORRECT THEM
