Essential Biology Content Areas to Review

2. GENETICS AND HEREDITY: PASSING ON TRAITS

Genetics questions are often concept-heavy and require you to apply principles to solve problems.

- **DNA Structure and Replication:** Understand the double helix, complementary base pairing (A-T, C-G), and the semi-conservative nature of

- replication. Know the roles of enzymes like helicase and DNA polymerase.
- **Protein Synthesis:** Transcription (DNA → mRNA in nucleus) and translation (mRNA → protein at ribosome). Understand codons, anticodons, and the role of tRNA. Be able to use a codon chart.
- **Mendelian Genetics:** Dominant/recessive traits, genotypes (homozygous, heterozygous), phenotypes. Be comfortable solving monohybrid and dihybrid crosses using Punnett squares. Understand probability rules.
- **Non-Mendelian Inheritance:** Incomplete dominance, codominance, multiple alleles (ABO blood types), polygenic traits, and sex-linked inheritance. Practice problems for each.
- **Genetic Technologies:** Be familiar with basic applications like gel electrophoresis (used in DNA fingerprinting), cloning, and genetic engineering (e.g., creating insulin-producing bacteria). Know ethical considerations.

3. EVOLUTION AND BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY: CHANGE OVER TIME

Evolution is the unifying principle of biology. Questions often ask you to interpret evidence or explain mechanisms.

- **Mechanisms of Evolution:** In addition to natural selection, understand genetic drift (bottleneck effect, founder effect), gene flow, and mutation. Know the difference between microevolution and macroevolution.
- **Classification:** Understand the hierarchical system (Domain, Kingdom, Phylum, etc.). Be familiar with the three domains (Bacteria, Archaea, Eukarya) and the six kingdoms. Know basic characteristics of each kingdom (Prokaryote vs. Eukaryote, Autotroph vs. Heterotroph, Unicellular vs. Multicellular).
- **Phylogeny:** Be able to read and interpret cladograms and phylogenetic trees to determine common ancestry and relatedness.

4. ECOSYSTEMS AND INTERACTIONS: LIFE IN BALANCE

Ecology questions often involve cycles, energy flow, and population dynamics.

- **Cycles of Matter:** Understand the carbon cycle (photosynthesis, respiration, combustion, decomposition) and the nitrogen cycle (nitrogen fixation, nitrification, assimilation, denitrification). Know the importance of bacteria in the nitrogen cycle.

- **Population Ecology:** Exponential vs. logistic growth, carrying capacity (K), limiting factors (density-dependent and density-independent). Predator-prey relationships.
- **Community Interactions:** Competition, predation, symbiosis (mutualism, commensalism, parasitism). Keystone species and their impact.
- **Biomes and Succession:** Major terrestrial biomes (tropical rainforest, desert, tundra, taiga, grassland, temperate forest) and their climate/characteristics. Primary vs. secondary succession.

Effective Study Strategies for the Biology EOC

Simply reading your textbook or notes is not enough. Active study techniques will help you retain information and apply it to unfamiliar questions. Incorporate the following strategies into your Gaston County Schools Biology EOC study guide routine.

USE PRACTICE TESTS AND RELEASED ITEMS

The North Carolina Department of Public Instruction (NC DPI) releases sample questions and prior test items. Your teacher may also have access to official practice tests. Working through these under timed conditions is the single most effective way to prepare. After each test, review every question you missed and understand why the correct answer is right. This process trains your brain to recognize question patterns.

CREATE VISUAL AIDS

Biology is a visual science. Draw diagrams of the cell, the stages of mitosis, photosynthesis vs. respiration, and food webs. Use flashcards for key vocabulary: ATP, enzyme, gene, allele, heterozygous, etc. The act of drawing and labeling reinforces spatial and sequential memory. For complex processes like protein synthesis, create a flow chart from DNA to protein.

You can quiz each other, create practice questions, and discuss tricky topics like codominance or the difference between homologous and analogous structures. 4. **Answer every question.** There is no penalty for guessing. Never leave a question blank. A guess has a chance of being correct; a blank has zero chance.
5. **Stay calm and confident.** You have been preparing all year. The night before the exam, get a good night's sleep and eat a balanced breakfast. Arrive on time with your calculator (check if allowed) and a positive attitude.
