THE HELICOPTER RESPONSE: ROY BENAVIDEZ TAKES ACTION

At the forward operating base in Loc Ninh, the distress call was received by the Command and Control center. Two Huey helicopters were scrambled to extract the trapped team. Roy Benavidez was not part of the extraction team that day. He was at the base working as a staff sergeant, recovering from a minor injury. However, when he heard the frantic radio chatter and realized that a Special Forces team was being annihilated, he knew he had to act.

Benavidez grabbed a medical bag and a knife. He ran to the flight line and boarded a helicopter that was already lifting off. He was a "volunteer" in the truest sense of the word. He had no weapon other than a .45 caliber pistol and a knife. His plan was simple: he would leap from the helicopter,

organize the survivors, and do whatever was necessary to get them extracted. He did not expect to survive.

THE RESCUE: A SIX-HOUR BATTLE AGAINST THE ABYSS

Of the 12 men, four were dead, and the rest were seriously wounded. Benavidez took command. He dragged the wounded into a defensive perimeter, treating their wounds under constant fire. He used his own body as a shield for a medic who was trying to save another soldier.

The first helicopter came down to extract the team. As the wounded were being loaded, an RPG struck the helicopter, blowing it apart. The pilot was killed instantly. The wreckage blocked the landing zone. Benavidez, now covered in his own blood and the blood of his comrades, had to pull the survivors out of the burning wreckage. He was shot in the leg, the back, and the face. Shrapnel from grenades lacerated his limbs. Despite these wounds, he continued to fight and organize.

A Second Helicopter and a Mortal Wound

A second helicopter arrived. Under the cover of suppressive fire from the helicopter's door gunners, Benavidez began loading the wounded onto the new aircraft. As he carried one man, a burst of automatic fire hit him in the abdomen. Intestines and internal organs were exposed. Uttering one of the most famous lines in military lore, Benavidez shoved his intestines back into his belly, taped his abdomen shut with a canteen cap and duct tape, and kept moving. He continued to drag and carry his comrades to the aircraft, despite a wound that would have killed most men instantly.

The Final Extraction

As the helicopter lifted off with the survivors, Benavidez realized that classified documents and radios were still on the ground. He jumped off the helicopter, recovered the sensitive material, and then ran back toward the helicopter. As he reached for the landing skid, he was shot again. He lost his grip and fell to the ground. The pilot, seeing Benavidez fall, knew he could not leave him. The helicopter came down again. A crew chief leaned out, grabbed Benavidez by the collar, and dragged him into the helicopter as enemy soldiers closed in. Inside the aircraft, his body was riddled with 37 separate bullet, bayonet, and shrapnel wounds. He was unconscious and presumed dead.

THE AFTERMATH: FROM DEAD TO HERO

Once the helicopter landed at Loc Ninh, Benavidez was pulled from the aircraft and placed in a body bag. A doctor, checking for a pulse, found a faint flicker of life. He was rushed into surgery. He was not supposed to survive the night. But he did. He endured months of painful surgeries and rehabilitation. For his actions, he was initially awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, the second-highest military honor. However, rumors of his incredible deeds spread through the Special Forces community.

The Fight for the Medal of Honor

A decade later, a congressional investigation and a review by the Army revealed that key witness statements and documentation had been lost. Several high-ranking officers, including a general who had witnessed the battle from the air, insisted that Benavidez deserved the Medal of Honor. On February 24, 1981, President Ronald Reagan presented Roy Benavidez with the Medal of Honor in a ceremony at the Pentagon. The President famously said, "If the story of his heroism were a movie script, you would not believe it."
