These ask "how many more" or "how many fewer." Example: "Sam has 7 toy cars. Ben has 4 toy cars. How many more cars does Sam have than Ben?" ($7 - 4 = 3$) These are often more challenging for first graders and require careful scaffolding.

5. TWO-STEP (SIMPLE) PROBLEMS

As the year progresses, some worksheets introduce problems that

require two operations, but still using small numbers. Example: "Jenny has 5 stickers. She buys 3 more. Then she gives 2 stickers to her brother. How many stickers does she have now?" ($5+3=8$, $8-2=6$)

How to Choose the Right Worksheet

Not all **word problems for 1st grade worksheets** are created equal. When selecting or creating worksheets, consider these factors:

- **Readability:** The text should be decodable for a first grader. Use sight words and simple sentence structures. Avoid long strings of text.

Examples You Can Use

Creating Your Own Word Problem Worksheets
